"Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." (John 20:21)

We are now in the season of Easter, learning what it means to be followers of a Savior who willingly accepted suffering and death in order to give us abundant and eternal life.

Learning new ways of doing things is scary. Every time the risen Christ appeared to his disciples, he had to say to them, "Peace be with you."

As the merger of Trinity and Hope progresses, we'll all be learning new ways to be church together, trusting that the peace offered by Jesus will continue to inspire our curiosity and our courage.

A lot is happening in the month of May—for me as an individual and for the members of both congregations.

I'll be spending two weeks in Europe with members of my family; we're travelling over there for the wedding of one of my nephews in Germany and then visiting Belgium, France, and the Netherlands.

On Sunday, May 4, the members of both congregations are worshiping together at Hope Lutheran Church at 9:30. These blended services give us a taste of what worship will be like when our merger is complete; please make an extra effort to attend them. We continue to make technology improvements to Hope and expect to have no difficulty livestreaming this service for those who can't attend in person.

Two years ago, we applied for a grant from our synod's "Vision to Action" program to fund the idea of turning Hope Lutheran into a community center for the Meadowlawn neighborhood. While we weren't awarded a grant, we were given \$2,000 and encouraged

to explore the possibilities on a smaller scale. We invested that money on making renovations to Hope's fellowship hall and installing improved technology.

On Friday, May 16, we're holding the grand opening of a space we've named "The CommUNITY Room," demonstrating all the possibilities that will be available. We'll have the room partitioned into different spaces for tutoring, games, and lectures, and we'll serve snacks and drinks for people to enjoy while watching a movie.

The film we're planning to show is "Keeping the Faith," which came out in 2000. It stars Ben Stiller as a young rabbi and Edward Norton as a young priest, childhood friends trying to revitalize the congregations they serve and both in love with the same woman. The film is rated PG-13; it has some bad language and mild sexual content but should generate some good conversation.

We plan to offer a film every month, along with a regular schedule of classes and activities. We'll offer the space for use by our neighbors as a source of income and to build a stronger relationship with the community. If you have ideas about classes and programs we could offer or if you're interested in volunteering for afterschool programs and such, let me know.

On Saturday, May 31, Brenden and our choir will present a concert of sacred music entitled, "Wayfaring Strangers." It had originally been planned for Holy Week, but had to be rescheduled so we could have the instrumentalists. Many of the beautiful anthems we've had in the past few weeks will be featured; check the music director's article for more details.

Trust the Lord Completely

There are many lessons that God's people have to learn and often it takes a lifetime to pass the different tests the Lord sets for each one of us. The book of Proverbs is filled with examples of both godly living, (behavior we should seek to emulate), and



unwise actions, (things we should eschew and avoid.)

There are many biblical principles to follow in this book of instructions, and many wise practices to develop. As we journey through life we should earnestly seek to develop these behaviors and attitudes, as we grow in grace and in a knowledge of the Lord Jesus. One such concept to embrace with understanding is, "The mind of a person plans their way, but the LORD directs their steps." We may make future plans and purpose in our heart how to achieve our desired goals, but God is the one who directs our path. He is the One Who establishes the steps we take.

Making plans for the future is wise and prudent. The Lord designed us with minds to think. He gave us a free will to make wise choices in life. The Bible advises virtuous living and prudent planning for we read, "those who plan good find loyalty and faithfulness" and, "plans are made by seeking wise and godly advice from others."

Paul was a man who often spoke of his plans to visit certain Churches and wrote of goals he wanted to achieve, but Scripture shows that although Paul made many good travel plans and purposed in his heart to visit certain Churches, not all were accomplished, for the Lord was the one that directed his path.

On one occasion we read that Paul's plans were rearranged by the Holy Spirit of God when he received a call from the Lord to forgo his own pre-developed arrangements, and go instead to Macedonia. Paul's plans were worthy and worthwhile, but God had ordained that he should change them and go and share the gospel with the people elsewhere.

Often the plans we make are deficient and nearsighted, but God in His grace often brings us to our desired destination in a very different way. Sometimes the goals we set are too limited or too limiting, but God will bring us to a place of fulfilment that we could

not have thought possible.

Sometimes the plans we make may be good and honorable, but God knows the end from the beginning and may take us to a different destination with a different expected outcome. But if we are living by faith and trusting His guidance, He will bring us to the place that He knows is best - not only in this world but in the eternal ages to come.

If we are prepared to die to self, live for Him and cry, "not my will but Yours be done", we may be sure that whatever plans we make, the Lord will direct our steps and guide us in the best way to go. James pointed out the folly of setting our future plans in stone by making arrogant claims about what we will do in the future rather we should express our future plans by saying, "If the Lord wills, we shall do this or that."

However carefully we consider our plans, we have a very limited view of the future. We do not know what will happen in the coming weeks and months. Indeed, we have no control over any of our tomorrows. But our times are in His hands, and because God can see the end from the beginning, we should be ready to bathe every plan we make in prayer and place each desire of our heart into His safe-keeping.

God not only knows the future, but holds the future in His hands. How wise, therefore, to use our rational thought and God-given free will to plan wisely, to the best of our ability, while recognizing that while God may permit our plan to move forward, He may overrule it or even advance it further. But what a comfort to know that while we have the freedom to make our plans, the Lord will direct our feet into the way that is best for us.

On March 23, 2025, Linda & Bob Gascon, Roma Heystek, Pat Shipley and myself, Terri Craig, had the privilege of hosting a group of young baseball players from Lutheran Southern High School in St. Louis Missouri. This was the fifth year they came to St. Petersburg during Spring Break to



fifth year they came to St. Petersburg during Spring Break to participate in a "Spring Training" baseball tournament.



The first time they were here was in 2020. That was in the middle of the Covid 19 pandemic. They desperately needed a place to be able to sit down together to eat meals for the 5 days they were here for the

tournament. They had arranged to do so at the hotel where they had booked their stay. Unfortunately, that didn't happen because the dining area in their hotel was closed. So, they decided to call local Lutheran

churches for assistance. After being turned down by three churches, they called our church office. Angie Pryor, our secretary, was more than happy to accommodate them. Because during the pandemic our Fellowship Hall was not being used, she offered



it to the team and their coaching staff. She arranged for Dan Boria, who lived right around the corner, to be their host each evening while they used the Hall. He was there each night to unlock and just be available for anything that they may have needed. Each year Dan looked forward to their visit and was there for the team. Needless to say, a very special bond was formed. When they came, they were equally as happy to see Dan and to share their stories. They even brought him a team jersey and hat. They were saddened when they heard he had passed away last year so they held a memorial service in the Memorial Garden to remember him.

Each year, as a thank you for the use of the Hall and for our hospitality, the team made a very generous donation to our Food Pantry.



They did it on a whim the first year but after that they raised money before their trip to allow the purchase of food and personal items to shop for and be donated. This year they raised \$550! The need for the use of our hall has been reduced but they still needed one night. On Sunday March 23, the five of us enjoyed a great time with food and fellowship. Each one of us was sat with between 5 to 6 boys. We shared things about our church,




and they shared things about their school and their team. At first, I didn't know what we would talk about, but the boys were very friendly and easy to talk to. We soon realized that we had our common faith in God. That made our conversations flow so



I was born in Orlando, Florida. We moved to Las Vegas, Nevada when I was young, and I have many fond memories there. When I was eleven we moved back to Florida and I grew up in Clearwater along with my three younger siblings. I went to Clearwater High. During my time in school I was given the opportunity to attend the Early College Program, which allowed me to attend St. Petersburg College

in lieu of taking high school classes. I loved my time there; learning has always been a great love of mine and I appreciated the opportunity. The program afforded me an Associate of Arts degree. Moreso it allowed me to spend my formative years among people of all different beliefs and backgrounds. It was a good experience.

My journey in recovery led me to all of you. When I was 24 I got sober and moved to St. Petersburg. At that time, I was searching for a church to attend. I had been raised in a church-going family, but over the years I had drifted away from church in general. Still, I had a longing to be closer to God. I began actively searching for a church that felt right, and even attended one as a guest -- and while welcomed, I did not feel like I was at home.

Then I found all of you! Something indiscernible was special about this church and these people, I felt in my heart, and I felt at home. I felt a connection.

Shortly after becoming a member of Trinity, I was diagnosed with thyroid cancer. You all surrounded me. I knew then that I had truly found a church family.

It has been a number of years since then. As some of you may know, I met my late fiancé Zach, and we moved back to Clearwater for a couple of years before returning to St. Petersburg. He loved this church every bit as much as I do, and he found much joy in coming. You loved him, and he you. When he passed, you surrounded me with your love and blessing. I am truly grateful to be a part of a fellowship of beautiful people with love in your hearts like yours.

Death Is Not The End


