
GREETING





Glory to you, O Lord

¹In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. ²This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. ³All went to their own towns to be registered. ⁴Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. ⁵He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. ⁶While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. ⁷And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

⁸In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. ⁹Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. ¹⁰But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: ¹¹to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. ¹²This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger." ¹³And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying,

¹⁵When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." ¹⁶So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. ¹⁷When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; ¹⁸and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. ¹⁹But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.



Our Christmas Tree

Our Christmas Tree is actually a Chrismon Tree. The word "Chrismon" (short for "Christian monogram") refers to an ancient symbol for Jesus Christ or a part of his ministry. North American Lutherans have used Chrismon Trees since 1957; Frances Spencer and the women of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia, created the first.

The evergreen tree is itself a symbol of the eternal life secured for each of us by the death and resurrection of Jesus. Traditionally, a Chrismon Tree is decorated only with white lights and Christian symbol ornaments hand-made from white and gold materials.

The Chrismons on Trinity's tree were made by many members of our congregation. They make use of a variety of Christian symbols including:



The Star of David which reminds us that Jesus was Jewish.



The Crown of Thorns, a symbol of Jesus' suffering and death.



The Butterfly, a symbol of the resurrection.



The Fiery Chariot, a symbol of Jesus' ascension into heaven.



The first and last letters of the Greek alphabet; Jesus is the beginning and the end.



The Shamrock symbolizes the Trinity: God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.



The Cross and Circle are a symbol of Christ's eternal reign over all the earth.



The first letters of "Jesus Christ, God's Son, Savior" spell *ichthus*, the Greek word for "fish."



The Star of Bethlehem, which proclaimed the birth of Jesus.



The Dove, a symbol of the Holy Spirit.



The Anchor Cross, a symbol of hope and of the Church.



The Chi Rho uses the first two letters in the Greek word Christ, or Messiah.
