

January is the time to make...and then reconsider...New Year's resolutions. Changes to food and drink. Good habits and bad ones.

As we begin a new year as a recently-merged congregation, may I request that each of us resolves to build relationships with people from "the other church"? We are now one congregation, but we don't know each other's stories, achievements, or concerns.

Invite someone to go to lunch after worship. Even better—invite them to your home.

As was the case last year, I want to spend the month of January visiting with many of you and getting to know you better. I especially want to catch up with people who haven't been able to worship as regularly as they used to. Don't be surprised if you get a phone call from me!

Other ways for us to strengthen our relationships will come in some programs I want to start or revive in this new year.

Now that we're only having one service each Sunday, I want us to add an education time on Sunday mornings. Worship will be from 10:30 to 11:30; fellowship time from 11:30 to 12. And then I'm hoping many of you will stay on for an All-Ages Education Hour.

I think we can figure out ways for our kids and adults to learn from each other by turning our fellowship halls into "one-room schoolhouses." We can work together to teach Adair Hamilton (and remind ourselves) about some of the basics of the Christian faith and

get her ready to receive the sacrament of Holy Communion. And then we can start getting her brother Aaric ready for Confirmation. As we do that, we can share with one another how we have experienced the love of God in our lives.

In addition to the Education Hour, I want to start a mid-week Grief Support Gathering.

So many of us are coping with the loss of a loved one, whether it happened last year or a decade ago. I'd like to provide us with an opportunity to talk to one another and encourage each other.

I've purchased copies of a little book called "ABCs of Healthy Grieving: A Companion for Everyday Coping" by Harold Ivan Smith. It is a series of very short reflections, covering topics from A to Z.

Those who are willing are encouraged to buy a copy of the book from the church office for ten dollars and read it over the next few months.

Each week we'll get together to talk about what we've read and how it impacted us.

And finally, I want to get a Small Group Ministry up and running. I'm looking for people who are willing to have six to eight people come to their home or to some other quiet meeting place once a month. Once I have the hosts, I'll work with them to make a list of people to invite. I want to intentionally put together people who don't yet know each other particularly well but might have a lot in common.

With all of these projects, my prayer is that we will start to worship together, work together, and dream together—as one.



# People Get Ready

"People Get Ready" is a 1965 single by the Impressions, and the title track from the People Get Ready album. The single is the group's best-known hit, reaching number three on the Billboard R&B chart and number 14 on the Billboard Hot 100. The gospel-influenced track was a Curtis Mayfield composition that displayed the growing sense of social and political awareness in his writing.

In 2021, Rolling Stone named "People Get Ready" the 122nd greatest song of all time. The song was included in the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame's 500 Songs that Shaped Rock and Roll. "People Get Ready" was named as one of the Top 10 Best Songs of All Time by Mojo music magazine, and was inducted into the Grammy Hall of Fame in 1998. In 2015, the song was selected for preservation in the National Recording Registry due to its "cultural, historic, or artistic significance".

Martin Luther King Jr. named the song the unofficial anthem of the Civil Rights Movement and often used the song to get people marching or to calm and comfort them.



Various artists have covered the song, including Bob Marley and the Wailers in 1965 and 1977, the Chambers Brothers in 1968, Bob Dylan in 1975, and Rod Stewart and Jeff Beck in 1985. Australian group Human Nature had a minor hit in Australia with their version in 1997.

## Composition

The gospel-influenced track was written and composed by Curtis Mayfield, who was displaying a growing sense of social and political awareness in his writing. Mayfield said, "That was taken from my church or from the upbringing of messages from the church. Like there's no

hiding place and get on board, and images of that sort. I must have been in a very deep mood of that type of religious inspiration when I wrote that song."

"People Get Ready" is in a long tradition of Black American freedom songs that use train imagery, such as "Wade in the Water", "The Gospel Train", and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot". The idea comes from the spiritualist idea that once one dies the soul goes in a journey to the afterlife.



## YAG LASER CAPSULOTOMY ~ Possible Aftermath After Cataract Surgery....

This may be a bit off the typical gadget articles I write, but it's very important information regarding the possible aftermath of having necessary Cataract surgery. Understand that while you're reading this that I'm not a Medical professional, but highlighting my own experience and newly found knowledge. Cataract surgery is a clouding of the natural lens in your eye that you are born with. This lens is normally clear. When clouding occurs, it keeps light rays from passing through the lens and focusing on the retina. The retina is a thin layer of nerve tissue that lines the inside of the back of the eye and is sensitive to light. Cataracts become more of a noticeable nuisance as we get older, typically after the age of 40. When they start to appear, they are the result of the proteins in the lens of your eye breaking down and clumping together. This clump makes a cloudy area on your lens and is known as a cataract. It results in blurry, hazy, or less colorful vision. Again, most cataracts happen due to natural changes in your eyes as we get older. The typical medical remedy for cataracts is surgery resulting in a procedure to remove the lens of the eye and, in most cases, replace it with an artificial lens. While this procedure is an immediate remedy it

## Council Highlights

### MISSION and MOVEMENT

The December meeting marked the second time that members from both Councils met together. Following the opening prayer and devotions, updates from both campuses were shared:

At the **Downtown campus**, issues with the Stamp Club's leased space are being researched, including possible water/mold concerns, with updates expected before the January meeting. Until issues are resolved, the Stamp Club will be meeting on the third floor. **Guided tours** of both campuses will be offered in January for the Council and open to any member who might be interested in learning more about how space is being used for ministry (a critical step in moving forward as a merged congregation): the Downtown tour will follow the service on **January 11<sup>th</sup>**, and the Meadowlawn tour will follow the service on **January 18<sup>th</sup>**.

At the **Meadowlawn campus**, the solar project was finalized in time for the IRS rebate, and the *Memorial Garden* was discussed, emphasizing the need for accurate records and preserving it as a holy space for whatever direction we take as a congregation.

**Discussion items** included the awarding of the *Vision 2 Mission Dinner Church Grant* as a means for reaching out to non-members in our community. Pastor Paul emphasized that a congregational team will need to be formed to learn about and lead this ministry; more details will follow in the coming weeks. Additionally, components for the *City Church* lease were finalized and will be presented to their church leaders for review, prior to submitting it to our synod's legal team. Preparation for the *Annual Congregational Meeting* focused on defining council effectiveness, budget preparation, and communication.

The **Treasurer's Report** noted plans to consolidate to one finance team, maintain current financial processes until the Annual Meeting, renew the *QuickBooks* subscription, and to update council members' preferred contact information.



Born and raised here in Sunny St. Pete! I grew up with my grandparents (thanks to God forever for that), and deeply immersed in our church, St. Andrew Lutheran ELCA. My grandmother was the church secretary and after my grandfather retired from his mechanic job, he was the groundskeeper/maintenance person. Needless to say, I was there all the time (yes, scurrying all over the place bare foot!).

When I was newly becoming an “independent” young adult, my grandparents fell ill and passed away. I lost everything, including my traditions, structure and faith. I was down a lost path. Several years later, I decided I was going to become a Rescue Swimmer and save lives. Against all odds, that’s precisely what I did, as the only female rescue swimmer during that time, for the entire Atlantic fleet.

After my service, I moved to beautiful British Columbia where my husband was from. When our marriage came to an amicable end, I moved back here in 2019, just in time to enjoy all the things I missed before the “circumstances” happened (covid). Silver lining is I spent the time working on improving and restoring my true self, who had been hiding very deep inside. It took a lot of work for her to re-emerge.

I avoided going back to St. Andrew because I rejected being ambushed by the emotions I knew would hurt so much, but I finally did. Being rejoined with my roots restored my missing traditions and faith. Alas, I wanted to visit other Lutheran churches. Trinity was the first and only one because I immediately loved it, there was no reason to search further. I am blessed to be with such a wonderful congregation. I believe God “gave me” so many challenges in life knowing I’d overcome them and return to Him as the best version of myself.

may not be the final end to your problem. I had Cataract surgery a couple of years ago and thought this issue was behind me only to learn that a YAG LASER CAPSULOTOMY was now necessary in one eye. Yag Laser Capsulotomy is a procedure to help you to see clearly after you've had Cataract surgery. You may need this type of surgery because months, or even years after Cataract surgery, your vision may get fuzzy again. This happens when a membrane in your eye, known as the posterior capsule, becomes cloudy. Unfortunately, since this issue, while common, only happens in some cases, you may not be advised of such a possible reoccurrence after your Cataract surgery. The procedure takes less than a minute and does not require all the pre/post preparation and care that Cataract surgery does. It also may only happen in one of your eyes, and yes, I know of a recent case where it happened days after the original Cataract surgery. So, I hope this was informative and you never need to have this done!

## Christian Symbol:



**SHIP** — The Christian church has long been symbolized by a ship. While the Old Testament tells of Noah's ark preserving righteous people during the flood, the New Testament recounts Jesus calming the storm that battered the disciples' fishing boat. St. Ambrose described the church as a ship with the cross as its mast, and others have compared salvation to being drawn out of the sea of death into the safety of the church (ship). Indeed, many large churches are constructed to represent a big boat, with the main worship space called the nave — Latin for ship.

## Church Membership Records & Directory



Anyone who is **added** to the church directory will receive an email with a "Unique Identifier" which will enable you to access the directory — either on your computer (<https://directory.ucdir.com/>) or on your smartphone (download from apple's app store or from google play).
